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In order to preserve the quality of the water and the environment around Lake Tremblant, here are a few reminders:

- Provide a place for garbage and recycling on board your watercraft to avoid any trash making it's way into the lake;
- If you are a resident of Lake Tremblant, ensure that you are following provincial guidelines on how to preserve the lake when living on its shores;

- Be very mindful when fueling your watercraft to avoid any spillage in the lake. Many tools and devices are available locally that help you properly fill your boat with gas;
- Always wash your watercraft, and the trailer it comes with, immediately before putting it in the water;
- If you have a toilet on board your boat, ensure that no matter can end up in the lake.

OVER TIME, WATER STUDIES HAVE SHOWN THAT THE QUALITY OF THE WATER IN LAKE TREMBLANT REMAINS STABLE. IT IS OUR COLLECTIVE DUTY TO PRESERVE THIS STANDARD.

OUR ACTIVITES

AS YOU KNOW, OUR LAKE IS A FANTASTIC PLACE TO PRACTICE WATER SPORTS. IN ORDER FOR EVERYONE TO BE ABLE TO ENJOY THESE ACTIVITIES SAFELY, RESPONSIBLY AND RESPECTFULLY, THE FOLLOWING IS RECOMMENDED:



- Practice all non-motorised water sports, with the exception of sailing, within 60m of the shore;
- Maintain a reasonable distance with anyone practicing a water sport, whether it be swimming, kayaking, paddle boarding, etc. or a person behind a motor boat, such as someone waterskiing, tubing or other;
- Never cross in front of a sail boat or any other sailing device, the tour boat, the barges or any other vessel that is difficult to maneuver;
- Avoid making excess noise or waves near the shoreline;
- Avoid remaining in front of the same residence for extended periods of time;
- Maintain a legal level of sobriety that allows for the safe and responsible navigation of your watercraft;
- Avoid the use of any watercraft that is excessively dangerous, fast or loud, such as a personal watercraft (PWC) as Lake Tremblant is patrolled by the SQ.








OUR NAVIGATION

GIVEN THE FACT THAT MANY PEOPLE SHARE THIS WONDERFUL BODY OF WATER, IT IS IMPORTANT TO NAVIGATE SAFELY AND RESPECTFULLY. AMONG OTHER THINGS, IT IS SUGGESTED TO:



- Practice water sports such as waterskiing, wakeboarding, wakesurfing and tubing in the center of the lake;
- Depart from the shore perpendicularly. Which means, when leaving your dock, head towards the center of the lake before turning right or left;
- During events on the lake, sporting or cultural, navigate carefully, respecting the participants and organizers. Extra caution is required when there is a high volume of traffic on the water;

- Maintain a 100m distance from the shore and from islands when possible;
- Respect NO WAKE zones and reduce your speed to a point where no waves are produced in these areas;
- Be vigilant when gathering in bays to ensure not to create a disturbance for the residents of that area;
- Make sure your watercraft is equipped adequately according to Transport Canada's Safe Boating Guide.


